Timberlake Girls Win 3-

The Timberlake girl's cross-country team won their third straight cross-country state championship last weekend at Eagle Island State Park in Eagle.

Timberlake junior Ashly George was Timberlake's top finisher as she would finish in third place with a time of 19:34.1.

"I was a little disappointed because I wanted to get second or win," said George. "I'm a little bummed out, but this is nothing to be ashamed of." Salmon's Alice Keller was the overall winner with a time of 18:58.26

Timberlake's Rachel Ward finished in sixth place, Natalie Herring was seventh and Brooke Nowlan was eighth.

"It has been our goal all year and we just went out and did it," said Nowlan. "It feels amazing."

The Timberlake boys finished in seventh place overall in the team standings. Sam St. Mars was the top Tiger finisher in 14<sup>th</sup> place.

Timberlake 41 Kellogg 13**

Timberlake clinched the Intermountain League football title with a 41-13 win at home over a much improved Kellogg team last Friday night at Van Tuinstra Memorial Field.

Timberlake scored three unanswered touchdowns in the first quarter including a pair from Devin Smith to lead the Tigers to a 21-0 lead in the first quarter.

In the second quarter after a Kellogg touchdown and heavy rains began drenching the field, Timberlake's Trenton Reese scored from the goal line to put Timberlake back up by three touchdowns.

Christian Heth's touchdown in the third quarter gave Timberlake their biggest lead of the night at 35-7. Quarterback Brian Cronnelly tacked on a late touchdown in the fourth quarter when he ran it in from inside the five yard line to make it 41-13.

Heth finished with 147 yards on 22 carries and scored two touchdowns to lead Timberlake who are currently ranked No. 4 in the Idaho 3A rankings.

Kellogg, who finished at the bottom of the IML a year ago, finished with a 4-1 record in the League this year and will travel to take on top ranked Fruitland (9-0) this weekend in a state playoff opener.

Timberlake (6-3, 4-0 IML) will play host to third-ranked Weiser (8-1) this Saturday.

**Lakeland Plays Middleton Friday**

4A IEL champion Lakeland, who had a bye this week, will face Middleton at Corbit Field in Rathdrum this Friday night. Middleton (8-2) is the third-ranked team from the Snake River Valley Conference.

Both teams had the option of either playing the game on Friday night or on Saturday afternoon and it was agreed by both coaches to play the game on Friday night.

"Of the two teams we saw play last weekend I think we match up better with Middleton," said Lakeland coach Tim Kiefer who traveled south last Friday to see Middleton play.

## AN OPEN LETTER TO THE RESIDENTS OF RATHDRUM

The Rathdrum Community has been a good place to pursue the American dream. Whether people raise their families and retire here, participate in the local sports or enjoy the abundance of the great outdoors, I think everyone agrees this is a great place to live. But having been involved in local groups like the Lions Club, the Rathdrum Food Bank and the Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Committee, I feel concerned about the stagnant state of our town.
